## School Description and Mission Statement (School Year 2010–11)

Encinal School is located on the peninsula, approximately 35 miles south of San Francisco. Encinal is one of the four schools in the Menlo Park City School District with an enrollment of approximately 750 students in grades K, 1, 3, 4, 5.

The school's mission statement is: Encinal provides an enriched, challenging learning environment where students are actively engaged in the development of knowledge, skills and attitudes to support their success as learners in a global society.

## Opportunities for Parental Involvement (School Year 2010–11)

Parental involvement is highly valued and encouraged at Encinal School. Parents are active participants in all aspects of the educational program. Attendance at Back-to-School Night, Parent Conferences, Open House and other community events range from 90-95%. Parents regularly assist with classroom activities including enrichment programs by volunteering in a multitude of ways around campus. The majority of families are members of our PTO and the Menlo Park Atherton Education Foundation which provide critical funding to enhance the education experience for our children.

Emergency preparedness also includes close cooperation and planning with police, fire, civic emergency agencies and school/parent groups.

## IV. School Facilities

### School Facility Conditions and Planned Improvements (School Year 2011-12)

The Encinal School campus includes a large playfield and blacktop area, classrooms, an art room, two multipurpose rooms, and a science lab, as well as administration and conference areas. With support from our community, Encinal School was fully modernized in 2000. In 2006, the community approved a \$91.1 million bond measure to improve district facilities. Currently, Encinal is undergoing a major reconfiguration to become a K-5 school. In the fall of 2010, a new state of the art fourth and fifth grade complex was completed at Encinal School, the final phase in the campus reconfiguration to become a K-5 school.

The Encinal campus also includes a sizable school garden. Each class maintains a plot throughout the year. Garden lessons are coordinated with the California State Standards for the grade level and managed with the help of parent volunteers.

The District takes great efforts to ensure that all schools are clean, safe, and functional. To assist in this effort, the Director of Maintenance and Operations and the site Principal conduct regular walk-throughs to identify and prioritize necessary maintenance projects.

The District maintenance staff keeps the school in good repair and working order by completing necessary tasks in a timely manner. A work order process is used to ensure efficient service and that emergency repairs are given the highest priority.

Cleaning standards for all schools in the district have been established. The Principal and Director of Maintenance and Operations work closely with the custodial staff to develop cleaning schedules to ensure a clean and safe school.

The District participates in the State School Deferred Maintenance Program, which provides state matching funds on a dollar-for-dollar basis to assist school districts with expenditures for major repair or replacement of existing school building components. Typically, this includes roofing, plumbing, heating, air conditioning, electrical systems, interior or exterior painting, and floor systems. The District budgets and transfers 0.5% of the general fund budget to the deferred maintenance program annually. The district's complete deferred maintenance plan is available at the district office.

### Types of Services Funded (Fiscal Year 2010–11)

The District provides Encinal with a part-time teacher for limited English proficient (EL) students, GATE funds for identifying and serving gifted and talented students, and a reading specialist program for students requiring special assistance in language arts. Support also includes speech and language specialist, a resource specialist, psychologist, school counselor, a nurse, and Special Education staff. A full-time librarian staffs the library. Books are purchased with district funds, state funds, and monies raised by the PTO. In the summer of 2008, all classrooms were outfitted with SMARTBoards to enhance instruction, and mobile laptop carts were assigned to each grade level.

## Standardized Testing and Reporting Program

The Standardized Testing and Reporting (STAR) Program consists of several key components, including:

- **California Standards Tests (CSTs)**, which include English-language arts (ELA) and mathematics in grades two through eleven; science in grades five, eight, and nine through eleven; and history-social science in grades eight, and nine through eleven.
- **California Modified Assessment (CMA)**, an alternate assessment that is based on modified achievement standards in ELA for grades three through eleven; mathematics for grades three through seven, Algebra I, and Geometry; and science in grades five and eight, and Life Science in grade ten. The CMA is designed to assess those students whose disabilities preclude them from achieving grade-level proficiency on an assessment of the California content standards with or without accommodations.
- **California Alternate Performance Assessment (CAPA)**, includes ELA and mathematics in grades two through eleven, and science for grades five, eight, and ten. The CAPA is given to those students with significant cognitive disabilities whose disabilities prevent them from taking either the CSTs with accommodations or modifications or the CMA with accommodations.

The assessments under the STAR Program show how well students are doing in relation to the state content standards. On each of these assessments, student scores are reported as performance levels.
